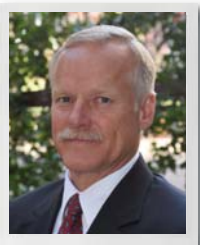

A Professional's Perspective

"Having a certification means something. It is hard to obtain, but it is worthwhile to have."

Dennis Cavanaugh, CID
Designer, Agri-Valley Irrigation, Inc. (Fresno, Calif.)

Certified irrigation designer Dennis Cavanaugh feels that certifications are a win-win situation for both companies and individuals.

He should know, having been in the field for nearly 40 years. For the last 22, he has served as a designer for Agri-Valley, which produces 400 to 500 irrigation system designs annually.

"Certification is a way to maintain high standards that set your company apart from competitors," Cavanaugh explained. "In California especially, large farming companies expect, and sometimes require, vendors such as Agri-Valley to have certified designers on staff. You have to have certified employees to compete in this area of the industry."

Regardless of where your company is based, Cavanaugh believes that having certified irrigation designers on staff is good for a company's reputation and is a value-added benefit for existing and prospective customers.

But it was Cavanaugh's personal desire for self-improvement that first drove him to earn his CID. More than 20 years after earning his degree in ag business, Cavanaugh felt he needed more training to improve his design skills, so he decided to pursue IA certification.

Now that he has his CID, Cavanaugh feels all of today's professionals could benefit from the high standards of knowledge, experience and professionalism required by the IA Select Certified program.

He now encourages his co-workers to earn their CID designations as well. And he believes especially that "new graduates need certification. Training beyond the degree is needed to do the work."

Certification Update

As the most widely accepted certification program in the industry, IA's Select Certified program continues to be upgraded and expanded in pursuit of the long-term goal of accreditation by the National Commission for Certifying Agencies. Recent improvements to the program include:

- **Launch of the certified agriculture water manager program.** Debuted at the 2010 Irrigation Show, the CAWM recognizes experience and excellence among industry professionals who evaluate, operate, manage and improve agricultural irrigation systems to achieve the highest possible level of water-use efficiency.
- **Significant changes to the CEU policy.** These include simplification of the CEU qualifying activities list, transition to a two-year CEU renewal cycle in 2011 and implementation of a new cancellation and retake policy. For more on CEU changes, visit www.irrigation.org/ceus.
- **Update of CLIA and CGIA programs.** The certified landscape irrigation auditor and certified golf irrigation auditor exams introduced new test questions in December 2010 to more accurately reflect the professional's job in the field. Field audit submission and retake policies were also clarified.

"We work hard to get our employees certified."

Ewing Irrigation (Phoenix, Ariz.)

"You can profess all you want about how you train your employees, but this independent standard holds more weight. IA is the leading trade association for our industry. A certified employee means that the leading authority has validated our skill set to the customer."

Jim Borneman, vice president of educational services at Ewing, noted that the company counts approximately 75 certified employees, the highest number of certified individuals in any one company in the country.

"We actively promote our certified professionals to our customers, and we work hard to get our employees certified," he said. It not only proves their level of knowledge to clients but also encourages continuing education, one of Ewing's four key corporate values.

Borneman noted that due to Ewing's emphasis on the benefits of certification, a number of the organization's customers have since become certified, even altering their business models to focus more on water conservation and integrate audits.

For companies like Ewing, the benefits of certification are vast: "It validates your skill set to the customers and helps you understand your level of proficiency. Your staff is supported by an additional level of technical training. Because ultimately, you want to sell customers not on what's trendy but on solid solutions."

"For a contractor, I can think of no better class that would prepare you to get involved in all types of certifications than the auditor class," said Borneman. He also identified how certified professionals are becoming recognized by states. In California, the Department of Water Resources has implemented the AB1881 ordinance requiring new and renovated landscapes over 2,500 sq. ft. to be audited by a certified landscape irrigation auditor.



Government/Public Affairs Initiative

Government Affairs Update



The IA is working hard to establish its national grassroots program to help our members become successful advocates for their company and the industry. The objective of the program is to engage IA member volunteers in building relationships with state and federal level legislators and policymakers to raise awareness of industry issues and positions. Some key efforts to date include:

- **Introduction of IA's national grassroots program, IA IMPACT, including:**

- *Launch of the Legislative Coordinator program.* Designed to put "boots on the ground" at the state level, IA member volunteers will serve as key points of contact between state governments and IA government affairs staff. These legislative coordinators will be the eyes and ears of IA on legislative and regulatory issues in their states.

- *Completion of the third annual Legislative Conference held in Washington, D.C., in March.* The conference brought member volunteers and IA staff members to Capitol Hill. Contacting more than 40 congressional offices, participants addressed lawmakers on agricultural conservation funding, EQIP, WaterSense, and the economic and environmental benefits of efficient irrigation.

- **Finalization and posting of position statements that clearly define the association's political positions.** Now on IA's web site, these statements are critical tools for members and staff as well as the local, state and federal lawmakers they engage. These position statements set a clear direction for IA to successfully advocate for policies that support our mission.

Standards Initiative

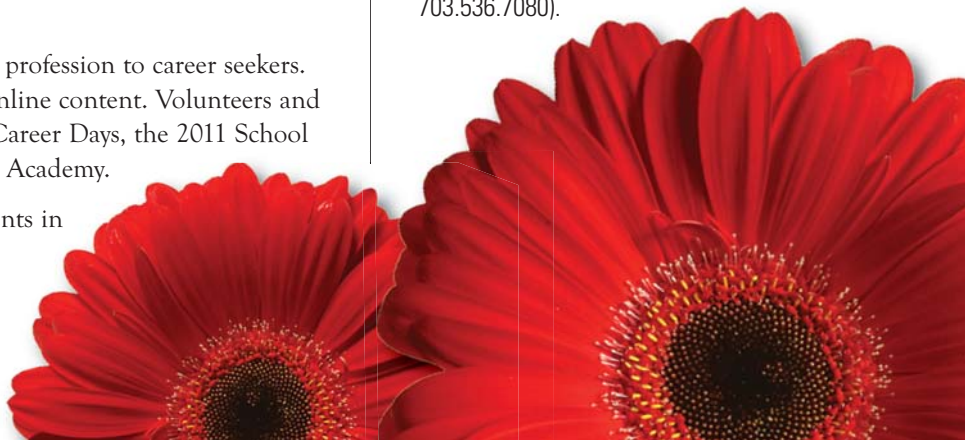
Establish products and practice standards that drive efficient irrigation.

Standards Update

IA's standards initiative incorporates existing efforts (such as the Smart Water Application Technologies program) while expanding our influence over the development of industry standards. Recent activities include:

- Changes to the IA Technical and Standards Committee. Brian Vinchesi, CGIA, CIC, CID, CLIA, CLIM, CLWM, president of Irrigation Consulting (Pepperell, Mass.), is serving as chair. Jake LaRue, product manager at Valmont Irrigation (Valley, Neb.), serves as vice chair. Committee members work to ensure irrigation industry standards and codes reflect irrigation best practices.
- Submission of comments on the Environmental Protection Agency's WaterSense program regarding the draft weather-based irrigation controller specification.
- Development of the SWAT testing protocol for soil moisture-based sensors (for turf-grass and landscape irrigation). View the protocol online at www.irrigation.org/swat/control_sensor.
- Advocating for standards to benefit the irrigation industry at the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials Green Technical Committee meeting and the International Code Council's Green Construction Code public hearings.

Education Initiative

Education Update

In 2008, the Foundation was granted responsibility for content development tasks to improve the quality of irrigation education available and to streamline the augmentation of the association's educational resources. Education delivery continued to be a key strategic initiative for the association as well, and in December, IA created an education task force to examine the industry's education needs. This task force recommended that more resources be dedicated to education, including the hiring of a full-time education director.

Therefore, in December development and distribution of all educational content was returned to IA, allowing the Foundation to focus on its core goal of promoting careers in irrigation. In moving education back to IA, the association will increase its ability to advance industry knowledge and build toward its vision of being the authority on irrigation.
